This past **Friday, January 10**, marked the halfway point through another school year and the end of the 1st semester for the 2024 – 2025 school year. Linking History and Literature By: Mrs. Blankespoor

Hello from the 6th-8th history, English, and literature classroom! I can't believe we are beginning the second semester already!

One of the best aspects of teaching both history and literature is that these subjects can so easily tie together. I've had several opportunities to link literature and history with the 7th and 8th graders this school year. Just as we began studying the establishment of the American colonies, we read the novel Johnny Tremain by Ester Forbes which tells the story of a young man who witnesses the events leading up to the Revolutionary War in Boston. In this connection, we read the poem "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere" by a famous early-American poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow and compared this poem to the accurate historical events of that night. We then discussed the benefits of primary sources-first-hand accounts of a historical event-versus secondary sources which may give room for an author's personal bias or mistakes. We also read a section of the sermon "Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God" by Jonathan Edwards while learning about the Great Awakening in colonial America. This sermon has some amazing word pictures describing a spider being hung over the fire and a bow and arrow being held ready to shoot, so the students illustrated what they read with some insightful drawings.

In 6th grade history, the study is of ancient civilizations. This has been a blast to prepare for as well! I'm quite thankful for the helpful librarians in Sioux Center and Hull who often receive a large online checkout list to prepare for me. Currently, we are concluding a unit on ancient China. We read an assortment of picture books to help us visualize what life was like in ancient China. One story told about a young boy put to the test by the emperor, and who chooses to tell the truth rather than a lie. We also read a picture book describing a family who travels on the ancient Silk Road. The Silk Road was a trade route from China all the way to Antioch and then across the Mediterranean Sea to Rome. I think the best part of this unit was when an intuitive student commented, "Hey, maybe God used traders to spread the word about Himself and King Solomon to the Queen of Sheba, and then she came with a caravan to see him." Now THAT makes a teacher's heart sing!!

If there is one goal in all the study of written word, historical accounts, and parts of speech, it can be wonderfully summed up in the theme verse of our classroom, "Come and see the works of God." Psalm 55:6a.
